



GREENBROOK SUPPLIES RNID WITH ACCESSIBLE DOOR CHIMES

GreenBrook has supplied 1,000's of wire-free door chimes to RNID, the largest charity representing the nine million deaf or hard of hearing people in the UK.

Suitable for both deaf and hard of hearing customers, the Greenbrook DW050AH chime features a high intensity flashing xenon light alarm and the version RNID sells produces an extra loud tone, at around 65dB at 1m. It also has an impressive 100m working reception range from the bell push.

Mark Catling, Director of RNID Products, said: "This GreenBrook chime represents good value for money for our customers, around two thirds of whom are private individuals with the remainder being social services departments".

The wire-free door chime brings a new level of features at an exceptionally competitive price. Clever use of wireless digital technology means the door chime receiver may be taken anywhere in the home or garden or mounted on a wall.

The bell push is usually fitted to the outside of the doorframe, but the GreenBrook unit can be used with the existing hard-wired bell push in conjunction with the DW070A wire-free transmitter.

Additional chimes can be operated from one or more pushes and multiple pushes can be programmed with one of three ring melodies.

The versatile chimes feature 16 frequencies to prevent nuisance operation from neighbouring pushes. It can be used in a silent mode, but with the flashing xenon light, in order not to disturb the entire household; this is particularly useful for households with infirm adults or babies.
